**GENERAL REASONS FOR THE DECISIONS ON THE ALLOCATION OF 2015/16
RIGHTS TO OPERATE FISH PROCESSING ESTABLISHMENTS**

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1. Introduction – Preparations for Allocations

This document is titled the *"General Published Reasons for the Decisions on the Allocation of Rights to operate Fish Processing Establishments (FPEs): 2015/16"* and will be referred to as the "GPR". The GPR sets out the criteria, the process and methodology and the policy reasons for the decisions on the allocation of rights in this sector. Applicants are therefore advised to carefully study the GPR before considering the assessment of their applications and the specific reasons for decisions taken. This GPR should be read in conjunction with the General Policy on the Allocation and Management of Fishing Rights: 2013 ("the General Policy") as well as the Policy on the Allocation of Rights to Operate Fish Processing Establishments: 2015 ("the Policy").

On 27 July 2001, the Department issued a notice inviting applicants to apply for rights to operate FPEs (government gazette No. 22517 of 27 July 2001 ("the gazette")). The applications were received, evaluated and rights were granted for a period of fifteen (15) years, expiring on 31 December 2016. The gazette indicated that an opportunity would again be granted in 2002 for additional applicants to apply for rights to operate FPEs. The opportunity never materialized.

After the 2001 process a vast number of fishing companies were formed and received rights to exploit fish resources in various fishing sectors. In order for these right holders to process their catches, and to meaningfully participate in the fishing industry, their land and sea-based processing facilities were exempted from the provisions of Section 18. Though exempted, these right holders had to apply for permits in terms of Section 13 of the Marine Living Resources Act, 1998 (Act No. 18 of 1998) (MLRA). In 2005 the General Policy for the Allocation of Long Term Fishing Rights (LTRAMP), stated that a separate policy would be adopted dealing specifically with FPEs. No further long term rights to operate FPEs were issued in 2005/2006 or 2013.

The Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries ("the Department") commenced the current allocations process, which is known as the Fishing Rights Allocation Process 2015/16 ("FRAP 2015/16"). The Department undertook several preparatory steps for FRAP 2015/16 and these are summarised in this section.

Firstly, the Department published eleven draft Sector-specific policies on the allocation of fishing rights on 12 June 2015 for public comment. Consultative meetings were held at various venues in all the provinces. These meetings covered the geographical area from Port Nolloth to Richards Bay and commenced on 07 July 2015. Consultative meetings in the inland Provinces commenced on 04 August 2015. The dates, times and venues of the fifty two (52) consultative meetings were published in local, regional and national print media as well as displayed at all Fisheries Compliance Offices along the coast. Included in these

consultations were meetings with the representatives of the commercial fishing industry as well as small-scale fishers' associations. Public meetings on the draft sector specific policies were held at the venues as set out in **Table 1** in Chapter 4 below.

In addition to the hosting of consultative meetings on the draft sector specific policies, the Department also made provision for a formal notice and comment process. Any interested and affected party was permitted to submit formal written comment by 17 August 2015. After consideration of all the comments received by the due date of 17 August 2015, the Department published the final sector specific policies, the application forms and the final application fees and grant of fishing right fees in the Government Gazette No. 39417 on 16 November 2015. The 11 policies were published in the four predominant coastal languages, namely, English, Afrikaans, isiXhosa and isiZulu.

The Department thereafter embarked on a country-wide process of distributing the fishing right application forms to prospective applicants in all coastal and inland provinces. The Department appointed PricewaterhouseCoopers Inc. ("PWC"), an audit, assurance, tax and consulting services firm to provide independent administration and control over the distribution and receipting process of FRAP 2015/16. PWC's key audit functions were to *inter alia* –

- Oversee and monitor the fair, timely and legally compliant distribution of policies and application forms;
- Oversee and monitor and fair, timely and legally compliant receipt of application forms;
- Oversee and monitor the capturing of application form data and the creation of scoring and evaluation databases; and
- Observe the evaluation, scoring and decision-making processes.

In assessing and allocating fishing rights to applicants in the 10 fishery sectors and the Fish Processing Establishment sector, the Department had to evaluate and assess **5588** applications receipted¹. Each application submitted contained detailed information on the Applicants' identification and contact details, current and previous involvement in the fishing sector, general investment in fishing vessels, performance and compliance history as well as their transformation profile and contribution to the fishery. This information was used to score and weight each application with the objective of identifying the applicants to be granted fishing rights with reference to the Policy and General Policy objectives, as well as the provisions of Section 2 and 18(5) of the MLRA.

¹ This number included applications that were subsequently assessed as having been improperly lodged, were materially defective or failed to satisfy one or more of the essential requirements determined for the fishery concerned.

Each application, together with all annexures was captured onto a secure on-line database created and managed by Data World (Pty) Ltd, an independent Information Communication and Technology (ICT) consulting company, acting under the instruction of the Deputy Director-General: Fisheries Management Branch who is the appointed authority delegated with the powers of allocating commercial fishing rights under section 79 of the MLRA. The accuracy of the data capture was verified by an independent auditing firm, Business Innovation Group (BIG), for 100% of applications. The creation of the FRAP 2015/2016 database comprised the second major preparatory step in the process.

Thirdly, the Delegated Authority, Ms Siphokazi Ndudane (DDG: Fisheries Management), appointed and instructed Assessment & Advisory Teams ("AT") for each of the fishery sectors for which rights are to be allocated. Each AT was chaired by a senior official in the Department and included fisheries managers, scientific advisors, legal advisors, fisheries compliance personnel and an administrative support team. The Delegated Authority met frequently with the AT to provide further instructions and to receive briefings on the evaluation and scoring of applications.

2. Access to Information and Reasons

Every Applicant in this sector will receive the following information:

- a. A Notification Letter, informing the applicant of the Delegated Authority's decision, together with the reason for that decision;
- b. A copy of the General Published Reasons; and
- c. An Appeal Form, which must be completed and submitted within the stipulated timeframe, if the applicant chooses to appeal against the decisions on the allocation of a right or effort by the Delegated Authority.

The specific reasons contained in the notification letter to unsuccessful applicants and the GPR constitute the reasons for the decisions to decline an application for a right in this fishery. Applicants that have been excluded will only receive Notification Letters outlining the reasons as to why their applications were excluded.

Access to other information, including information pertaining to other applicants will be dealt with in terms of the procedures and provisions of the Promotion of Access to Information Act, 2000 (Act No. 2 of 2000). The prescribed Access to Information Form must be completed and submitted to the Department's Customer Service Centre, Ground Floor, Foretrust Building, Martin Hammerschlag Way, Foreshore, Cape Town (attention: Mr. Msimelelo Mdledle Deputy Director: FRAP). The application will be assessed in terms of the Promotion of Access to Information Act 2, 2000 (Act No. 2 of 2000). The prescribed access fee of R 35.00 must be submitted together with the application. Access fee for the information is

calculated at 60 cents per A4 size page, A4 Page for Court Cases R2.50, R40 per compact disk and R15 per hour for each hour of search and preparation of the information.

3. Appointment of the Delegated Authority

The Minister of the Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries, in terms of Section 79 of the Marine Living Resources Act, Act 18 of 1998, appointed the Deputy Director-General: Fisheries Management as the Delegated Authority responsible for the allocation of rights to operate Fish Processing Establishments.

4. Registration, Distribution and Receipting of Applications.

The application registration and distribution process started on 23 November 2015 at 08h00 and closed on 11 December 2015 at 16h00.

Applicants were required to produce their Identity Document when collecting the Application Form and a copy of the first page of the identity document in the case of an appointed representative of the prospective applicant. If the application form was collected on behalf of an Applicant, the Department required an Authorisation Letter as well as a copy of the Applicant's Identity or Registration Documents and the Identity Document of the person collecting the Application Form. Applicants were also required to provide their full contact details.

All the thirty three (33) distribution centres also functioned as receipting centres. The list of the centers were also published in local and major print publications as well as displayed in all Fisheries Compliance Offices. The centres were staffed by departmental officials on a full-time basis. These activities within the centers were monitored and audited by the PWC. The receipting process opened on 1 February 2016 at 08h00 and closed on 12 February 2016 at 16h00. However, at the request of a number of prospective applicants, the Minister decided to extend the receipting period process and such it recommenced on 22 February 2016 at 08h00 and closed on Friday, 26 February 2016 at 16h00 at selected venues.

A total of **16 778** application forms were issued by the Department to prospective applicants. A total of **5588** applications were received during the receipting process.

5. Application and Grant of Right Fee

In terms of section 25(1) and (2) of the Marine Living Resources Act, 18 of 1998, the amount for the Application Fee for this sector was consulted during the Consultation Period and was determined by the Minister with the concurrence of the Minister of Finance at R 9123.00 in Government Notice 1170 of 25 November 2015. A grant of right fee is not applicable for rights granted to FPE's.

6. Auditing

PWC has been appointed as process observers for the entire FRAP 2015/16 process including distribution, receipting and allocations.

7. Interactive application process

Applicants were able to communicate with the Department's FRAP Operations Support Team in the period between consultation, during Policy Review Process and during of the Appeals Process by phoning a dedicated call center on 021 402 3727 (FRAP) or via E-mail: FRAPenq_2015_16@daff.gov.za. Responses were provided directly to prospective applicants. Frequently asked questions as well as all the media statements were posted on the Department's website (<http://www.daff.gov.za>) and were also made available at distribution and receipting center to ensure that consistent responses are provided by the support FRAP Operations Support Team.

An anonymous tip-off line to report any fraudulent or unethical practices pertaining to FRAP 2015/16 was established. The tip-off line is **0800 203 785** (toll-free) and it is manned by an independent forensic

consulting company, SizweNtsalubaGobodo on behalf of the Department. The anonymous tip-off line will also remain operational until all the appeals have been finalised in the 10 fishing sectors.

8. Decision Making Process

As explained above, the delegated authority was assisted by the Assessment Panel (AP) to evaluate all the applications. In summary, FRAP 2015/16 assessment involved the following steps:

8.1 Data Capturing: The delegated authority appointed a Verifications Team. The primary function of the Verification Team was to capture the applicant's data and verify that all the requisite information is correctly captured to reflect the application as was submitted by the applicant.

8.2 Database Development: In accordance with instructions issued by the Delegated Authority, Data World (Pty) Ltd designed and created a database to capture each applicant's application(s), facilitate the analysis of applicants' data across a range of criteria, including, the form of the applicant, compliance, equity and historically disadvantaged individuals, job creation and procurement, safety and working conditions and vessels (if applicable). The purpose of the database was to assist with the evaluation and scoring of application forms and for identifying aspects which required specific verification and consideration by the Delegated Authority. Data World (Pty) Ltd created a secure, robust and effective database that now houses all application data. The Delegated Authority approved the technical design of the database, as well as the design and testing of the reporting module.

8.3 Criteria and weighting design: Due to the fact the allocation of rights in this sector is non-competitive, applications were not scored, weighted and compared to each other.

8.4 Assessment by the AP: The role of the AP was to determine whether the applications were properly lodged, not materially defective and met the essential requirements of the sector and to assess the information provided in each application and, where necessary, to provide any relevant comment to alert the Delegated Authority to any particular aspect of an application.

8.5 Instructing the Assessment Teams: Each AP was briefed and instructed by the Delegated Authority and the legal advisors informed on, *inter alia*, the following:

- The applicable statutory provisions and case law;
- The General Policy and the Policy adopted by the Minister for the sector;
- The detailed exclusionary criteria to be applied and how aspects of the Policy are to be interpreted and implemented; and

- The purpose of each question asked in the application form applicable to the sector.

8.6 Guiding the Advisory Committees: Over the duration of the evaluation process, the Delegated Authority met with the Assessment Team and if necessary, instructed them further on the manner in which to evaluate or verify information a particular aspect of any application. The legal advisors ensured that the AP adhered to the policy and statutory prescripts at all times.

8.7 Decision-making: After all applications were evaluated, the AP presented the results to the Delegated Authority. The Delegated Authority then considered the evaluation results in respect of each applicant, having regard to the application. The Delegated Authority specifically considered each and every application identified for exclusion in terms of one or more of the exclusionary criteria.

9. Applicants for rights to operate Fish Processing Establishments

A total of **146** applications were received for rights to operate Fish Processing Establishments. Of these, **145** were submitted by entities and **1** by an individual.

As the allocation process adopted for this sector is a non-competitive one, streaming of applicants into “previous right holder” or “new entrant” categories was unnecessary.

10. Criteria Used for Decision-Making

The criteria adopted for decision-making in this sector were determined as set out in the General Policy and Policy. Every application receipted was scrutinized as follows and in the following order:

- Was the application properly lodged (evaluated against the “improper lodgement” criteria and requirements)?* If not, the application was removed from the process and marked as an improperly lodged application and the reason for this evaluation recorded. If yes, the application proceeded to the next round of evaluation.
- Was the application materially defective (evaluated against the “materially defective” criteria)?* If no, the application proceeded to the next round of evaluation. If yes, the application was removed from the process and marked as a materially defective application and the reason for the evaluation recorded.

- c) *Did the application satisfy the "essential requirements" for the sector?* If not, the application was removed from the process and marked as having failed an essential requirement for the sector and the reason for this evaluation recorded. If yes, the application was considered as being successful and recommended to the Delegated Authority as qualifying for a right in this sector.

10.1 Exclusionary Criteria

The following exclusionary criteria were applied to each and every application for a right in this fishery.

Improper Lodgement Criteria

- a) Did the applicant lodge its application on or before 16h00 on 26 February 2016?
- b) Did the applicant pay the prescribed application fee in full and on time?
- c) Did the applicant lodge its application using the prescribed application form?
- d) Is the Applicant either a registered South African company, close corporation or South African citizen? [Trusts and co-operatives may not lodge proper applications in this sector and must be excluded].

Materially Defective Criteria

- a) Did the Applicant's authorized representative sign the application form and was his/her signature properly commissioned?
- b) Did the same applicant submit more than one application for a right in the same sector?
- c) Did the same applicant submit false information or false documentation?
- d) Did the same applicant fail to disclose material information for the purposes of evaluating its application?
- e) Did the applicant or any of its authorized personnel attempt to improperly influence the Delegated Authority or Minister with regard to its application?

Essential Requirements

- a) Did the Applicant violate a provision of the MLRA as per questions, 3.2 and 3.3 of the Application Form and where the sanction did not include the option to pay a fine?^{2 3}
- b) Did the applicant have an asset forfeited to the State for a violation of a provision of the MLRA as per question 3.5 of the Application Form?^{4 5}
- c) Did the applicant have a fishing right or permit cancelled or revoked during LTRAMP?
- d) Does the applicant present a paper quota risk as defined by the General Fisheries policy of 2013? In this sector, paper quota risks were by all accounts irrelevant.
- e) Did an applicant utilise its FPE right during the LTRAMP? If not, the application was refused.

11. The Delegated Authority's Final Decisions on the allocation of rights to operate fish processing establishments

The Delegated Authority has decided to allocate a total of **one hundred and twenty-nine (129)** rights to applicants to operate fish processing establishments (1 individual and 128 entities). The Delegated Authority excluded eleven (11) applications that failed to comply with the *proper lodgement and material defective* criteria set out above.

The Delegated Authority refused a further six applications by FPE applicants on the basis that they did not demonstrate access to a suitable FPE as required by the Policy. These applicants failed to either complete section 6 of the application form and/or to attach the required attachment(s).

The following lists are attached as annexures to this GPR:

- **Appendix A:** Right granted to the Individual Applicant; and
- **Appendix B:** Rights granted to the Entity Applicants.

² Where an applicant has merely been charged or accused of violating a provision of the MLRA, the applicant is presumed innocent and is not subjected to any penalty.

³ The Delegated Authority utilised the South African Police Services Case Management System to confirm transgressions.

⁴ The Delegated Authority directed each assessment team to consider the annexures provided by any applicant who answered this question in the affirmative to determine whether the applicant was ordered by a court of law to forfeit an asset. Only in cases of a court ordered forfeiture of an asset was an applicant to be penalized under this criterion.

⁵ Applicants who have been arrested or detained or had asset(s) seized, arrested or detained but where no finding of guilt has been ordered by a court of law will similarly not be prejudiced.

12. Appeals

Applicants will be informed of their respective rights to appeal any aspect of these decisions in accordance with the provisions of Section 80 of the MLRA in their notification letters. Appeals shall be addressed to the Delegated Authority and must be submitted in the manner stipulated by not later than 28 February 2017.

13. Grant of Right Letters


Every successful applicant will be provided with a written Grant of Right Letter immediately after the publication of this GPR. The Grant of Right Letter must be used to apply for a permit to operate an FPE in terms of Section 13 of the MLRA.

14. Duration of Fishing Rights

Rights to operate fish processing establishments are allocated for a **fifteen (15)** year period, effective from the date the right is granted.

15. Forensic investigations

An independent forensic company will be appointed to investigate the accuracy of information submitted by the applicants. Such verification will take place during and post the fishing rights allocation process. The forensic company will carry out investigations of applicants as and when required by the Department. If the applicant is found to have provided false information or false documents or failed to disclose material information, or attempted to influence the Minister or the Delegated Authority in the manner provided for in the General Policy on the Allocation and Management of Fishing Rights: 2013 as well as the Policy on the Allocation and Management of Rights to operate Fish Processing Establishments: 2015, proceedings in terms of Section 28 of the MLRA will be undertaken which may result in the revocation, cancellation or suspension or alteration of the conditions of a right held by such applicant.

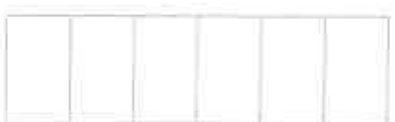
